Welcome to the all year round summer country! The weather in Ghana is mostly hot and humid throughout the year. We have rainy seasons but even in that season it isn't as cold as you may want. So pack more of summer clothes. Clothes made with cotton, silk and linen are preferable.

Water Bottle

Even though you can purchase bottled water from anywhere, having a bottle to put the mineral bottled water in, will go a long way. That way you refill as you move around and explore. Cosmetics Must Haves

Backpack or Flexible Carryon

You don't want to carry all your stuff while touring. Having a backpack or a small carryon or a cross-body bag will

Medication & First Aid kits

Whenever travelling for more than a week, make sure u pack your Pain meds for headaches, malaria course and other drugs like oral rehydration solution for dysentery.

- * Cotton wool

All these are easy to obtain in Ghana so you can skip them and get it when you actually need them

Photocopy Your ID & Passport

Your travelling passport and ID card are prove of your entry to the country legally and your identity as a citizen of your home country respectively. It can happen that you will need to prove your identity somewhere. Some tourists' sites require prove of identity. If this should happen, you can show them your photocopied one.

Also if by mistake you lose your items while exploring, you still have the original secured at your hotel. Always keep original at hotel- the only place you can hold someone accountable for lost items should that happen.

Fancy Travelling Bags

Okay before you cringe on this just hear me out. It should not necessarily be fancy but it should be different and easily recognizable. Stay away from BLACKS, GREYS and BROWNS as these are the popular colours of travelling bags most travelers use. Go for pink, red, green and any colour that looks good for you so that they are easy to spot by you at the airport.

IMPORTING OF LIVE DOGS

(AVI) INTO GHANA

DOGS ARE MAN'S BEST FRIEND.

ogs can be imported to Ghana. There are so many dog breeds in the world. Currently Ghana accepts all the dog breed types.

Before one imports a dog into Ghana, the importer needs to contact the Veterinary Department for an import permit to be issued before the dog can be imported, failure to get an import permit will attract sanctions or penalties. The permit entails some vaccinations that the doa owner or importer will need to have given to the said dog before the permit will be given for the dog to be imported. The importer would be required to provide test results for the under listed diseases before the permit for importation of the dog into the country would be issued:

- canine distemper
- · hepatitis
- parvovirus
- leptospira canicola and leptospira iceterohaemorrhagia e
- · parainfluenza

After the Permit is given the

importer will then do a booking with an airline that will accept to transport the dog either as a luggage or as cargo. The airline after accepting to transport the dog will contact the receiving country through the Ground Handler (aviance) to give approval to forward before the dog will be transported by the said airline. An importer who is bringing in a dog will need to have an agent to go through Customs documentation to get the dog cleared on his behalf.

The dog will have to be in a cage that is accepted by the airline and the dog will have to be provided with water and the food will be attached to the cage so that it can be fed on arrival here in Ghana if needed. Feeding instructions and any necessary information will need to be pasted on the cage of the dog and all handling information also stated on the Airway bill.

It is mandatory for the importer's agent to do all

the necessary Customs documentation before the arrival of the dog. When the dog arrives, the agent is expected to come to aviance import office for a copy of the airway bill to send it to Customs for release and come back with the release airway bill for payment of the handling charges.

The agent finally goes to the security checkpoint for a seal to confirm they are done with all the process and the dog is finally released to the importer/agent.

PROHIBITED ARTICLES

hen traveling by aircraft, there are prohibited articles that you are NOT permitted to bring with you in your hand luggage or hold baggage.

These articles can put a risk to the safety of the aircraft or to the passengers; hence, transporting these articles is prohibited or limited by regulation.

Items that are flammable, toxic, chemical or explosive are not allowed at all, both in your hand luggage and in your hold baggage.

Sharp objects such as knives, box-cutters, meat cleavers, razor blades, scissors, ice picks etc., are prohibited in carry-on bags but are allowed in checked baggage if sheathed or wrapped properly.

Articles discovered at security restricted areas will, normally, be apprehended. It is therefore important to check with the airline ahead of time when travelling by air.

In the same vein, shippers are also advised to refer to each country's Export Prohibited Articles' list before transporting items by air, to avoid confiscation and/or destruction of their shipment and sometimes, heavy penalties.

As a normal practice, Aviance Check-in Agents and Export Clerks keep reminding travellers and shipping agents, respectively of these prohibitions. In this way, they are able to save these parties from all kinds of problems.



Safety Corner

FIRST AID TIPS - A COMPREHENSIVE RESOURCE

"Take some time to learn first aid and CPR. It saves lives, and it works. "-Bobby Sherman



- * A blocked airway can kill someone in three to four minutes, but it can take more than eight minutes for an ambulance to arrive. So a simple procedure such as opening someone's airway can save their life whilst waiting for emergency help to arrive
- * During CPR, you should push on the chest at a rate of 100 to 120 compressions per minute. The beat of "Stayin' Alive" is a perfect match for this.

BEFORE ADMINISTERING CARE TO AN ILL OR INJURED PERSON, CHECK THE SCENE AND THE PERSON. SIZE UP THE SCENE AND FORM AN INITIAL IMPRESSION.

Pause and look at the scene and the person before responding. Answer the following questions:

- * Is the scene safe to enter?
- * What happened?
- * How many people are involved?
- * What is my initial impression about the nature of the person's illness or injury?
- * Does the person have any life-

threatening conditions, such as severe, life-threatening bleeding?

Is anyone else available to help?

IF THE PERSON IS AWAKE AND RESPONSIVE AND THERE IS NO SEVERE LIFE-THREATENING BLEEDING:

* Obtain consent:

Tell the person your name, describe type and level of training, state what you think is wrong and what you plan to do, and ask permission to provide care.

* **Tell a bystander** to get the AED and first aid kit:

Point to a bystander and speak out loud.

* Use appropriate PPE:

Put on gloves, if available.

- Interview the person:

Use SAMPLE questions to gather more information about signs and symptoms, allergies, medications, pertinent medical history, last food or drink and events leading up to the incident.

- * Conduct a head-to-toe check:
 Check head and neck, shoulders, chest and abdomen, hips, legs and feet, arms and hands for signs of injury. Make sure there are no obstructions of your visibility
- * **Provide care consistent** with knowledge and training according to the conditions you find.

IF THE PERSON APPEARS UNRESPONSIVE:

- * **Shout to get** the person's attention, using the person's name if it is known.
 - If there is no response, tap the person's shoulder (if the person is an



- adult or child) or the bottom of the person's foot (if the person is an infant) and shout again, while checking for normal breathing.
- Check for Responsiveness and breathing for no more than 5-10 seconds

IF THE PERSON IS BREATHING:

- * **Send** someone to call 911 or the designated emergency number and obtain an AED and first aid kit.
- * **Proceed** with gathering information from bystanders using the SAMPLE questions
- * **Conduct** a head-to-toe check.
- * **Roll** the person onto his or her side into a recovery position if there are no obvious signs of injury.

- designated emergency number and obtain an AED and first aid kit.
- * **Ensure** that the person is face-up on a firm, flat surface such as the floor or ground.
- * **Begin** CPR (starting with compressions) or use an AED if one is immediately available, if you are trained in giving CPR and using an AED.
- * **Continue** administering CPR until the person exhibits signs of life, such as breathing, an AED becomes available, or trained medical responders arrive on scene.

Note: End CPR if the scene becomes unsafe or you cannot continue due to exhaustion.
